Conference organized by electing for President, Bro. Joseph Smith; assistant President, Bro. Wm. Marks; for Clerk, Bro. Mart H. Forscutt ; assistant Clerk, James B. Henderson.

Those of the officers elect who were present took their places.

Conference opened in the usual form, the President offering up a prayer to the Great Roler for guidance in all things that might be done.

An opeming address was delivered by the Presidents on the great mercy displayed towards the church as God's people, and the obligations owing to Him from the church for its perpetuity and growth. Never has the elurch stood so high as to-day, never the spiritual attainment of the nembers wore manifest, never the demands for the: services of the ministry more numerous. Much had been done, much yet remained to be done. Some had labored faithfully and effectively, had acquitted themselves honorably. Yet one of the most insuperable obstacles in the way of our progress was inattention. The hunters and the fishers have been out, and in their reports and in the general features of the latter day work their was nothing to indicate failure . Some before trusted had been proved un-worthy-others mistrusted had been proved worthy. He would present as the most necessary thing, the preaching of the word by precept and by godly examplet: The most. effective preachers we can have: abroad are those who conduct themselres:
best at home. The buiness te be brought before the Conterence would be of at general nature, wich perhaps two or three exceptions. In all voting, he would enconrage those who had a right to a vote, to vote whether for or against any measure, frecky and openly, to be feank, but courteous.

Minutes of the Semi-Annual General Conference were read by the Clerk, and a very lungthy digcussion fothowed on the question as to whether in "approving" the minuteg of a previous conference, we endorse its proceedings, or simply testify to their being a faithfur record of what actually transpired, which was broken about noon by a motion bo adjourn to 1.30 .

Ihis case came up for adjudication before the Bishop's Court, Israel L. Rogers presiding, During its session held at bhe honse of Bro. Isaac Sheen, Plano, Kendall Co.. Ill, on the 4th day of April, 1868, in pursuance of a published notice in the Herald of Jan. 1st.. 1868, appointing April 4th as the time, and Plano, Kendeth Co.; Ill., as the place, for trying the said Johu Shippy on charges preferred against him for 66 misconduct, involving gross violations of the moral law, and the discipline of the chureh.'

The court assembled at 4.p. m., and after having been opened in due form, the case was called for; but the accused failed to appear.

Testimony was furnished that the said John Shippy had been officially notified, both by public citation through the $I$. $I$. D. S. Herald, and:by letter through the President of the Church, attested by the Church Recorder, and also through the President of his quorum, and it was therefore decided to proceed with the case as though theaceused were present:

Z; H. Gurley acted as prosecutor in ber half of the quorum, W. W. Blatix acted for the defence.

The witnesses were called, and after a cateful hearing of the evilenoe in the caseg and the pleadimgs of the councillors, it was decided by the Court that the charges were sustained.

The Court would therefore respectfully recommend to the Gerioral Conference to: convene on the 6 th irst., that the sail John Shinpy be disfellowshipped from the Church of J. C. of L. D. Discpussion followed, and the foregoing motion was amended by adding the following words at the close, "That may be presented to them by the elders."

The urrondment underwent a rigid examination, and some lengthy arguments were addueed, in consequence of which it was moved and carried "that we suspend the rules of the honse in order to admit of "a motion regulating the time to be aloted to oabl speaker.

The following was then offered by Bro. Gurley:

By request of the quorm of the Twelve, they were released from attendance at the next regular session, to enable them to sit in council in a guorum capacity.

On motion adjourned to 1.30, P. M.
